A Unanimous Vote at the Annual Parish Meeting Moves Us Forward

The parish gathered in the nave for the annual meeting on Sunday, March 12th at 10:00 a.m. The Rev. Oran Warder presided at an informative and inspiring meeting in which the members of the parish reviewed the year's budget, heard reports on our Lazarus Ministry and ministry in Sudan, and heard from Mr. Steve May, Senior Warden. Our rector's award of being made an Honorary Canon of the Cathedral of St. Matthew in Renk, Sudan was also presented. The highlight of the

meeting, however, was the unanimous approval by the congregation to move forward with the Shine as a Light Campaign, thereby renovating Wilmer Hall and Damascus House with funds from generous individuals and approving the debt necessary for the project. The deliberate time and efforts necessary to communicate the needs of and for this project came to fruition on that Sunday. After the approval vote was taken, we gave thanks together, singing the doxology with zeal.

Ramping Up for Phase 2—Norton Hall Renovations

The Parish at the March 12 annual meeting approved unanimously plans for a \$5,895,000 Phase 1 renovation of Wilmer and Damascus House to begin in Fall 2006. The Vestry wants to thank all parishioners who have pledged their support to the Shine as a Light campaign. With your financial commitments, St. Paul's has the resources needed to begin Phase 1 of a long-overdue renovation of our parish buildings and facilities.

The Parish-approved Building Program also calls for a continuation of the "Shine as a Light" campaign to fund the remaining \$590,000 cost of a Phase 2 renovation of Norton Hall. Key elements of the Norton Hall renovations include a new handicapped-accessible Garth entrance to Norton Hall and other building improvements. The Vestry wants to hear from families who have said that they are still considering a new or extended capital campaign pledge. With your help, St. Paul's can proceed directly with Phase 2 Norton Hall renovations in addition to Phase 1 renovations to Wilmer and Damascus House. 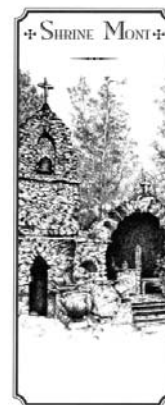

FOUNDATION CORNER

In her annual report to the Parish on March 12, 2006, Foundation President Janey Wallace told us that the St. Paul's Foundation ended 2005 with a balance of \$467,013.12 which is invested in the Diocese of Virginia's Trustees of the Fund. The Trustees of the Fund professionally manages endowment on behalf of the Diocese and individual parishes to assure good stewardship of the church's assets. The primary mission of the Foundation is the support and maintenance of our beautiful, historic buildings. In keeping with this goal, the trustees of St. Paul's Foundation have wholeheartedly supported the Capital Campaign by pledging \$200,000. over the next few years to support and reinforce the importance of our current responsibilities for future generations. To that end, the Foundation can only execute its mission with the financial help and support of the parish. In 2001, we established the COVENANT CIRCLE which is a society of parishioners who have remembered St. Paul's Church or St. Paul's Foundation in their will or estate plan. This group now stands at over 50 members but there is room for many more. We realized the importance of this wonderful parish in many of our lives and our need and willingness to give back to the Glory of God and in thanksgiving for our many blessings. Please speak to your lawyer or advisor about the many benefits that accrue for making bequests through your estate.

The St. Paul's Foundation grows three ways:

1. Gifts in memory of loved ones, in Thanksgiving or to the Glory of God;
2. Legacies and Bequests;
3. Market Appreciation.

We cannot always count on the third, market appreciation, to fund the work of this wonderful, vibrant and exciting parish. Your gifts and commitment to this place not only with your Time and your Talent but also with your Treasure are critical to maintaining and expanding our mission in this space, the Alexandria community and the greater world. As our rector, Oran Warder, reminded us in his address to the parish on March 5 that "where our treasure is, there will our hearts be also." Prayerfully consider supporting the work of this place through your weekly attendance, pledge, estate plan and other gifts in Thanksgiving and in support of St. Paul's mission.

Thinking about Planned Giving to the Church

What Is Gift Planning?

Gift planning encompasses a variety of ways that gifts can be made to the church from accumulated resources. It usually involves financial or estate planning; however, it is not reserved for the wealthy.

In general, planned gifts are made through:

- A Bequest in a Will
- A Life Income Gift...such as a pooled income fund, a charitable gift annuity, or a charitable remainder trust
- Gifts of Special Assets (real estate, closely held stock, life insurance)

Gift planning establishes a way for a donor to provide for family members while remembering the church as well. It often enables the donor to provide more for his or her heirs and to make a larger gift than thought possible. It often reduces taxes. Planned gifts can be designated for an organization's general fund or for its endowment. Planned gifts are either outright gifts (i.e., gifts of appreciated securities, real property, personal property, etc.) or deferred gifts (i.e., charitable gift annuities or charitable trusts).

A Bequest In A Will*

Perhaps the easiest and the most common way of making a planned gift is through your will. Yet some 50 to 70% of all Church members die without one. If you die without a will, the state will divide your assets among your spouse and children (regardless of their age); appoint an administrator that may cost the estate large fees; and appoint guardians, who may or may not have been your choice, for your minor children. By making a will, you appoint your own administrator; you name the guardian of your minor children; you control applicable taxes; you can create a family or charitable trust; and you can share

your resources with your family, church, or other institutions as you choose.

A bequest in a will can take the form of a set amount of money, a percentage of an estate, a specific asset, a trust, or the naming of a church related organization as a contingent beneficiary.

Sample language for including the church in your will might be: "I give, devise, and bequeath (state amount, asset, or percentage of the estate) to (name and address of the church) to be used (describe use) or as the church's governing board or vestry deems appropriate."

For hundreds of years through various editions of the Book of Common Prayer, Episcopalians have been encouraged to make a will, to provide for their families, and to make bequests for religious and charitable purposes if possible. In the Church we suggest you plan your funeral even before writing your will. This way you can make a statement about your life and can tailor your will to reflect your values. Preparing a will is a loving and responsible act for the sake of your family. Dying intestate is difficult for the family at best. Paul's letter to Timothy reminds us of the simple truth that "We brought nothing into this world...we can take nothing out of it." (1 Timothy 6:7)

Remembering St. Paul's Church In Your Will

St. Paul's Foundation, established in 1992, receives charitable gifts and bequests and makes long-term investments to provide for the future needs of our church's historic buildings and grounds. The Foundation is a tax-exempt organization, so any contributions are tax deductible.

The Covenant Circle of St. Paul's Church recognizes those parishioners who make it known to the church in writing that they have

provided for St. Paul's Foundation or St. Paul's Church in their will, estate plan or charitable trust. The Covenant Circle currently has over 50 members from our parish family. We appreciate the thoughtful gifts these parishioners have made to assure that the ministries of St. Paul's will continue well into the future. If you have already made provisions for a bequest to St. Paul's in your will or estate plan, please contact the parish office so that we may add you to this ever-growing list. Weekly Bible Study Anyone?

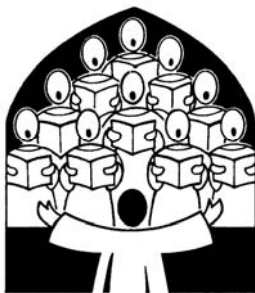

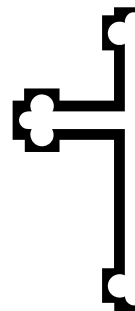
