# September 17<sup>th</sup> – Rector's Forum: "Third Time's a Charm: The Founding of the Virginia Theological Seminary"

This fall marks the bi-centennial year of the Virginia Theological Seminary. Drawing on research for his upcoming book about The Rev. Dr. Wilmer Holland Wilmer, Oran will explore the role of Dr. Wilmer and St. Paul's in successfully founding the long-awaited seminary, and ultimately in reviving the Church.

## September 24th - The Rev. George Caldwell: "Finding Hope:" a reflective conversation

George Caldwell is a priest associate at St. Paul's. Reflecting on his recently published book of meditations, first written for St. Paul's during the pandemic, George will lead us in a conversation about the ways we struggle - and succeed - in finding and holding onto hope. ## October 1st – Episcopal Schools Sunday: Rode Molla, Ph.D. "May they flourish": how our faith in action creates space for the holistic nurture of children

Rode Molla is an Assistant Professor, Berryman Family Chair for Children's Spirituality and Nurture at Virginia Theological Seminary. Dr. Molla's research and writing interests employ an interdisciplinary approach at the intersection of lived religion; the spirituality of children and families; and postcolonial studies.

## October 8th - The Rev. Alyse Viggiano, "Notes from a Sabbatical"

Clergy serving in a community for five years or more follow a practice of taking a sabbatical for rest and renewal. Our Associate Rector shares reflections and insights from her first sabbatical, including travels in Italy (and the town that bears her family name.)

## October 15th - Dyer/Horne Lecture: The Rev. Judy Fentress-Williams, Ph.D. "Generations: Genealogy as Story in Genesis"

Judy Fentress-Williams is in bi-vocational ministry in Alexandria, VA as the Dodge Professor of Biblical Interpretation at Virginia Theological Seminary and the Senior Assistant to the Pastor for Teaching and Preaching at the Alfred Street Baptist Church. Her fields of expertise include Hebrew Bible, dialogic interpretation, religious studies, Afro-American studies, and literary criticism.

## October 22nd - Owning our Faith series begins (October 22, 29; November 5, 12)

This 4-week series will explore the foundations of our Christian faith and practice, designed for those new to St. Paul's and for long-time parishioners who want to re-engage their faith and learn more about what it means to be Episcopalian. Each year St. Paul's clergy team considers fundamentals of faith with an eye to an undergirding theme. This year we consider "why church is good for us."

#### February 18th - Lenten series: "Love God; Love your Neighbor" (February 18th, 25th; March 3rd)

In summarizing faithfulness, Jesus gives us two commandments – to love God , and to love our neighbor as ourselves. Tending to our faith this season of Lent, we will turn our attention outwards to listen to and reflect on the stories of our neighbors , particularly in the immigrant community, as we seek to love more deeply.
